Mom McComb's Deviled Eggs



My mommy always made deviled eggs for Easter dinner and most summer holiday celebrations. All five of us kids LOVED them and usually sniped several before we ever sat down for dinner. Her delicious basic recipe is below, but what makes these extra special are the fun garnishes for the top. It makes for some yummy, memorable deviled eggs. If you have a crowd coming over, double this recipe.

Halve 6 hard-boiled eggs lengthwise; remove yolks and mash until smooth. Combine with...

1/4 C Miracle Whip

1/2 tsp sugar

1 tsp vinegar

½ tsp yellow mustard,

1/2 tsp salt & a dash pepper

1/2 tsp finely minced onion

Refill egg whites with yolk mixture, sprinkle with paprika and garnish each egg separately with either minced radishes, minced green onion tips, crumbled, crispy bacon, dill sprigs or sliced olives.

Grandma Rosella's Lemon Meringue Pie



Lemon Meringue pie is an Easter favorite, certainly one my mother always made for our special family dinners. If you happened to be lucky to enjoy a wonderful one, be sure to give extra hugs and kisses to whomever made this masterpiece, because if it definitely a pie with attitude to master.... I hope you enjoy this story my daddy used to tell us...

My father grew up during the depression on a small farm in Michigan. Like most folks during that troubled time, they did not have much money. Fruit that didn't grow in your own backyard was considered special and hard to come by. When my grandmother made lemon meringue pie, it was for special occasions only, such as Easter or company dinners. One summer Sunday in 1937, Reverend Frye was scheduled to come to dinner at my father's farm. My grandmother awoke at dawn to make the special lemon pie and placed it in the dining room window to cool while they were off to church. Unfortunately, Zip the beagle found the pie too much to resist and found a way to reach Grandma's masterpiece. Upon their return, nothing was left of the beautiful pie, but an empty pie pan and a contented dog sleeping with meringue stuck to his nose. Zip was sent to the barn from that day forward and poor Reverend Fry never got to enjoy my Grandma's pie that summer day so long ago. Fortunately for you, you can.
